




# @Reply Removal from 140 Character Count

## Express more with your 140 characters

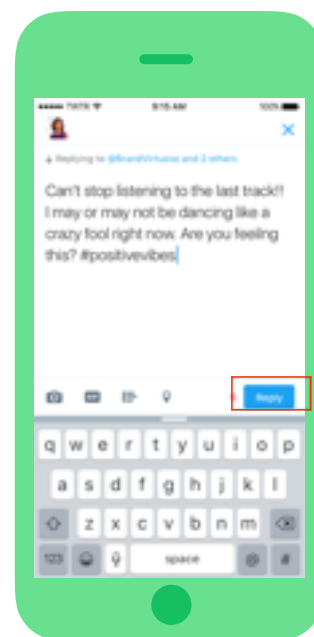
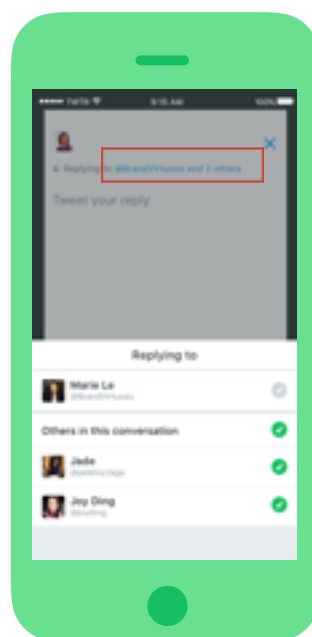
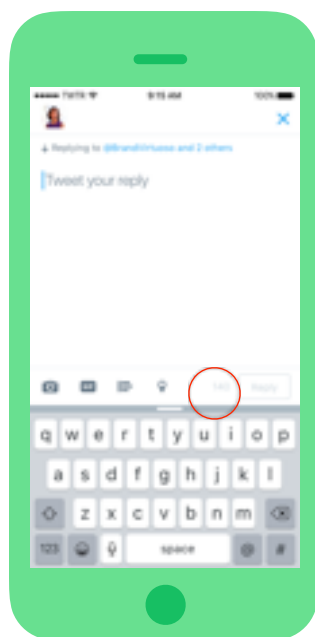
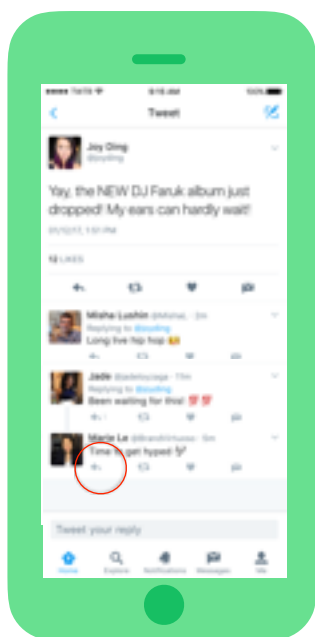
Now that @usernames are not added automatically to the beginning of replies, you can express more because you have all 140 characters for your reply

**1** Tap the  reply icon to join a conversation

**2** Now that @usernames are not added automatically to the beginning of replies, you have all 140 characters to use in your reply.

**3** Tap the blue text (@Username and x others) to bring up a reply editing screen and select who you want to reply to in each conversation

**4** Type the response and tap "Reply" to post.



## The details

- **Removing Users:** The people shown on the reply editing screen can be removed (except for the person to whom you are directly replying).
- **Blocked Users:** On the reply editing screen, accounts you have blocked will show in the recipient list, and will indicate that you have blocked them. From the reply editing screen, you can choose to remove the blocked account from the conversation by tapping on the check mark. A blocked user can still reply to the conversation, but you will never see their reply and they won't see any indication that you have blocked them
- **Adding Users:** To add additional people to a conversation, simply type their @username into your Tweet text. A manually typed username in the text box will still count towards your 140 character limit.
